SWIFT FEET (Pies Ligeros)

SYNOPSIS

The Tarahumara—one of the largest indigenous cultures in North America—live in the rugged canyons of northwestern Mexico. For them, running is not only the best way to get from one place to another, it is an important cultural tradition. They regularly compete in races that can last days and stretch well beyond a hundred miles. During the 1990s, Tarahumara runners Victoriano Churo and Cirildo Chacarito received international attention for their running abilities after they competed in several ultramarathons in the United States. Running in long, colorful shirts and sandals made out of rubber tires, they captivated the world with their strength and endurance.





DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

As I traveled over the past few years, to several indigenous communities in Mexico, my understanding of a reality different from my own was challenged, I realize that there is much misinformation about my country due to the great cultural and geographic distances that separate it, and in some cases, generate more conflict than unity.

This is why I believe that cinema can be a great tool for consciousness and transformation. It can help us learn, accept and understand the complexity of life that exists around the globe. Art allows us to learn from our past so we can change our present and future. It can help us address and change our society's problems and complexities.

Swift Feet challenges notions of fame, success, and identity. It aims to frame a way of life that is simple and precarious and where the social norms that the Raramuri have followed historically are still alive. It is also a call to observe freedom, the importance of the natural environment and detachment from material possessions.

Previous documentation approached Raramuri culture predominately through a scientific gaze. Pies Ligeros attempts to break this Western tradition by approaching the study of another culture in a much more personal and intimate way. The characters tell us their own stories and provide us with a richer context from which to draw our own conclusions. Their daily activities and dreams are the main elements that allow us to understand their culture that continues today.

The main goal of my work is to pay tribute to these two great runners, who 25 years ago opened the doors for younger generations and achieved the title of the greatest endurance athletes in the world.
