THE OTHER SIDE OF HOME

SYNOPSIS

In 1915 an estimated 1.5 million Armenians were killed by the Ottoman Turks. A Turkish woman, Maya, discovers that her great grandmother was a survivor of the Armenian Genocide. She decides to go to Armenia to take part in the 100 year commemoration of the Genocide in an effort to come to terms with her conflicted identity. The Other Side of Home is a universal story of identity, denial and how the experience of genocide creates a ripple effect for generations on both sides.



DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

My grandparents were survivors of the Armenian Genocide, so the genocide has always been a part of me. My whole life I wanted to make a film about it because to this day Turkey denies that it was genocide...so in a way, they deny my own family's history. But I didn't want to make a historical documentary about 1915. I wanted to tell a human story, a story about something that happened 100 years ago and how it still affects us today on both sides of the conflict.

So, in April 2015, 100 years after the genocide, I was on my way to Turkey. I was going to meet with a Turkish woman named Maya who found out that she has Armenian heritage. It was fascinating to me that this woman had two enemies in her. She embodied the conflict: one side that suffered because of the genocide, while the other side denied. In Turkey it is still taboo to talk about the genocide, but Maya bravely agreed to be part of the film. I think we both made this film for our ancestors, and we both understood the importance of starting a dialogue on a human level.

It was my first time in Turkey and I did not realize all the emotions I would be going through. In the same way Maya did not realize how emotional it would be for her to go to Armenia and take part in the 100th commemoration of the genocide. Making this film was way more than a film for both of us. It was an extremely difficult emotional experience, but a healing one in the end. I realized that genocide does not end the moment the killings stop. It actually continues and passes from generation to generation. And it is tragic that genocides continue until this day. There is so much darkness... but you can't win darkness with dark. I had to find the light.

I hope The Other Side of Home will spread light and show that in reality there is no enemy; we are all one.

Her passion is telling unique human stories that connect people and move beyond the boundaries of nationality, gender, and religion. Her last documentary, The Other Side of Home became and still remains as the only Armenian Genocide shortlisted for Oscar.
